ABOUT THE PROJECT

Beyond Voting: Increasing Women's Participation in the Political Process is a project that aims to strengthen women's capacity to participate in politics and shape government policies in Nigeria. From conception, the intervention has been supported by National Endowment for Democracy (NED) and four phases have been implemented successfully.

The Beyond Voting: Increasing Women's Participation in the political process project began in 2018 with an assessment of the six (6) geopolitical zones in Nigeria to determine the push factors that affect the representation of women in politics and governance.

The factors that came out strongly from all zones are patriarchy, cultural biases, party politics, high cost of elections, and gaps in the electoral law and the constitution, amongst others. significantly, the lack of mentorship by female politicians and capacity gaps affects the successive involvement of women in politics, and this stalls the advancement of Nigeria's democracy.

Those findings were utilized to engage in the second phase of the project in 2019, where the factors were further reflected in the 2019 general elections. A post-mortem of the elections conducted by PWAN showed that out of 2,970 women who contested, only 62 got elected to offices across the Federal and State levels. Post

the election, new appointments were made across Federal and State cabinets and only 4 female Ministers out of 44 were appointed at the Federal level and ninety women were appointed out of five hundred and twenty (520) men at the state level. PWAN began to monitor the performances of women in political positions in selected states in the country – Gombe, Ogun, Taraba, Ebonyi, and FCT were assessed.

The assessment revealed the clampdown on women in governance, stalling their contributions to growth and development in the state. This informed the key messaging for PWAN's campaigns at the grassroots (including engaging traditional leaders) to raise awareness of women's political inclusion in the four states. In this phase also, PWAN organized its maiden political leadership and mentorship program for young women across the country, in 2020.

Fifteen young women across the geopolitical zones were trained and mentored toward engaging politically to accelerate democratic reforms.

While the year 2020 brought about an acceleration in women's involvement in governance and decision-making, the third phase of the project contributed to building resiliency amongst the womenfolk and empowering them to push for Affirmative Action on women's representation.

PWAN expanded its Political Mentorship program where 30 young women interested in politics and 13 young female appointees benefitted. Given that mentorship is a continuous process and there is a need to amplify the voices of young people in Politics, the fourth phase of the project was implemented with a stronger focus.

Here, PWAN introduced a virtual school of politics where 89 young women benefited from a combined virtual and physical training and mentoring session. We also engaged continuously at the grassroots where over 200 people were directly reached with key awareness messages. Innovatively, We began to engage with political parties because the party processes mostly impede women's participation. Hence, with a women-focused agenda, PWAN strengthened the capacity of 13 women leaders across parties to equip them with knowledge and skills for more strategic party engagements that would close the gender gap.

The year 2022 came with a major wave because it ushered in a new political season, with the primary elections concluded in all parties, women's representation seems to remain with a question mark. In addition, the rejection of the gender bills and reconsideration of some by the National

Assembly on International Women's Month (March 2022) brought about mixed feelings regarding gender equality in politics because women were denied the right to full political participation and were only left with basic rights for their existence and dignity.

However, the Electoral Act 2022, which was assented to on 25th February 2022 provides a beam of hope for women who would be on the ballot in 2023 with its new/progressive provisions that would strengthen the electoral process.

To contribute to strengthening the process ahead of the 2023 elections, PWAN through the fifth phase of the project will build the capacity of security agencies on election security management to ensure the protection of women and observe the judicial process to ensure accountability in the electoral process and improve the chances for women's success in elections.

We would also continue to engage and support women leaders of political parties to strategically align their position with the goal of the party and serve as the gatekeepers for equality and empowerment of women at the party level.

TOWARDS GENDER EQUALITY AND CREDIBLE ELECTIONS IN NIGERIA

The present government administration which came to power in 2015 has recorded a further decline in the representation of women in parliament and other levels of governance in Nigeria. Statistics show that women's representation has never exceeded 6% since 1999 when the country transitioned to democratic rule.

According to Statista, females make up nearly half the population – at 101.67 million as of 2020, whereas only 6% of this population occupy political seats in Nigeria. Nevertheless, it is important to note that, as of 1999, only 2.5% of women held political seats, therefore, the current percentage indicates progress from where we were at the start of our democratic journey.

The journey to political and social inclusion for women met another roadblock on 1st March 2022 when the National Assembly downvoted the bill which sought to amend the Constitution and create 35% Affirmative Action on political appointments, create 111 special seats for women in the parliament, and 20% Affirmative Action for women in party administrations.

Although the rejection of the bill was partly due to the political system in Nigeria – First -past-thepost where the person with majority votes wins an election. A comparative sampling of African countries such as Kenya, Rwanda, South Africa, etc, where there are many women in parliament shows that those countries operate the Proportional Representation (PR) political system. Hence, a major step for Nigeria toward achieving gender equality in politics, is that the PR system is adopted.

The other sections of the bill which met reconsideration after a series of protests by Nigerian women were:

a) to amend section 26 (2a) of the 1999 constitution by opening citizenship registration to males and females; this means that if the Bill is passed, foreigners married to Nigerian women can apply for citizenship.

b) to alter Sections 31 and 318(1) (the Interpretation Section) of the 1999 Constitution to allow a woman to become an indigene of her husband's state after at least six years of marriage.

c) to alter Section 223 of the 1999 Constitution to provide 35 percent affirmative action to ensure women occupy at least 35 percent in a political party and appointive positions at the federal and state levels.

The recalled sections were tagged a "national embarrassment" because it was insensitive to the fundamental human rights and dignity of women.

Considering that this incident occurred

immediately after PWAN political leadership bootcamp, on international women's month, and during election season, it is unfortunate that the 9th National Assembly failed to earn a positive slot in history by ensuring that the Affirmative Action bill is passed into law. Its passage would have contributed to the motivational factors for young women in politics across the nation.

As the 2023 General Election approaches, Women's Representation across all levels of Governance still begs the question given the results of the recent off-cycle Gubernatorial Elections in Anambra and Ekitistates.

No female candidate emerged for the Anambra Governorship seat while 2 emerged for Ekiti; however, 3 women in Anambra and 7 in Ekiti vied for Deputy Governorship seats, although none of them successfully won the seats. Going by this level of performance, women's political representation is still a critical challenge in 2023.

In addition, the Electoral Act, 2022 was signed into law by President Muhammadu Buhari on the 25th of February 2022, amidst several debates, advocacies, reviews, etc from all stakeholders. This provides some high expectations for women

who would be on the ballot in 2023 given some of the new provisions that may provide a significant threshold for women.

For instance, section 50 empowers the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) to determine the procedure for voting and transmission of results at an election, electronically or manually where applicable. Other progressive sections include sections 33, 5(12), 54(2) – special assistance for vulnerable groups, 64(9), etc. These would go a long way in ensuring that women are not rigged out of power because the voting process usually serves as a major

impediment to their success.

While the efforts of Civil Society Organizations such as PWAN, Yiaga Africa, ElectHER, and Gender Centre for Empowering Development (GenCED) in campaigning for women and youth to participate in politics cannot be overemphasized, Nigerian women expect that the next National Assembly will recall the gender bills and ensure that it is passed to enable women to occupy more political positions for better, inclusive, and sustainable democratic reforms.

Hon. Dame Blessing O. Nwagba, Ph.D. was the First Woman in the History of Abia State to be a major party front-runner for Governor in the 2018 2019 Gubernatorial elections. She was an Honorable member representing Aba North Constituency in Abia State House of Assembly from 2011-to 2019, during her time in the State House of Assembly, she was the Chairperson, House Committee on Commerce and Industry, Chairperson, House Committee on Health, and Chairperson, House Committee on Women Affairs, respectively.

Hon. Nwagba also occupied various leadership positions in the public and private sectors, such as Member, Board of Management at University College Hospital, Ibadan, Director, Belzy Nigeria Limited, Director, Fulfilment International Academy, and College, Chief Youth Development Officer at the Ministry of Education and Youth Development, Umuahia, Member, and Policy Director at Aba North Local Government Education Authority, amongst others.














ABDULKAREEM ROFIAT OMOTAYO
