



ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE



WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

The organization employs an approach that embodies continuous improvement - internally to promote a center of excellence building the capacity of young women from internship to senior level positions and externally to produce value-driven and context-specific output. The organization is modelled to address key issues within security and governance:

- Citizen Security: Nigeria is confronted with security challenges and social inequalities which are exacerbated and persistent in marginalized communities where there is a high level of distrust for the government. Through its citizen security program area, PWAN works to improve relations between the government and the citizens. These efforts involve activities to enhance the capacity of women to engage in politics and governance and provide a collaborative platform and cooperation between security agencies and oversight bodies.
- Rule of Law: The Nigerian Legal/Judicial institutions are faced with various challenges impeding the Successful promotion of the Rule of Law and effective dispensation of justice with corruption and inadequate capacity overshadowing constitutionalism and constitutional democracy. To address this, PWAN through its Rule of Law program area works to improve transparency and accountability through court observation, provision of technical support that hastens the dispensation of justice, and training/capacity buildings of criminal Justice Actors.
- CSO Strengthening: PWAN works with Civil Society organizations to strengthen their capacity and ensure they become resilient and can function and thrive within the closing civic space. The organization has published a memorandum on the NGO regulatory bill and participated in conversations about the CAMA Act. To further improve CSOs' accountability, PWAN is currently implementing a project that seeks to ensure that CSOs are more deliberate and conscious in addressing sexual harassment and inappropriate conduct.

PWAN has remained a source of information and a learning platform for young women who are encouraged to pursue their goals despite the constraints that come with being a woman.

CITIZENS SECURITY PROGRAM AREA

The leadership landscape in Nigeria is characterized by a pronounced disparity, as women constitute almost half of the population yet hold a mere fraction of decisionmaking roles. This disparity reflects entrenched cultural and societal norms that sustain patriarchal attitudes, inhibiting women's mobility and potential.

In response to this pressing issue, our Citizens Security Program Area has adopted a comprehensive and multifaceted approach aimed at promoting security governance, amplifying women's representation in politics and governance, and fostering community-led initiatives that prioritize the security and protection of women, girls, vulnerable and marginalized group.

Through a collaborative and inclusive framework, we facilitate dialogue and cooperation among security sector stakeholders, empower women to participate in politics and governance, and support community-led initiatives that promote security, protection, and social justice for marginalized groups.

Additionally, PWAN has fostered an enabling environment for government and citizen relationships. It has created and implemented projects to improve security governance in Nigeria and West Africa. As a result of what we do, citizens are well informed and participate in government decisions that affect their lives.

By facilitating important conversations between security sector stakeholders, this program area ensures inclusive and transparent governance as a foundation for a democratic and prosperous society, ensuring credible elections by building capacity for state and non-state actors, and developing creative ways to prevent and combat violent extremism.

Through a cooperative advocacy approach with all stakeholders, PWAN works to create a more stable society by addressing security issues and inequalities prevalent in marginalized groups. Nigeria faces many security and social inequality challenges, both of which contribute to the exacerbation and persistence of these issues.

INTERVENTION MEASURES AND STRUCTURE

ESTABLISHMENT OF PWAN STRUCTURES AS AN ENGAGEMENT MODEL : Promoting Community Engagement, Access to Justice, and Protection for Marginalized Populations in Niger, Kaduna and Katsina State

SUPPORTED BY: FOREIGN, COMMONWEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT OFFICE (FCDO)

The story of Hasfat, Safiya, and Amina is a testament to this impactful intervention that illustrates the importance of engaging with the community, promoting access to justice, and protecting marginalized populations in Nigeria.

Hasfat is a lady in her mid-twenties who is physically challenged and resides in Lapai, Local Government Area of Niger State. She was impregnated by a man who took undue advantage of her natural predicament and put her in a family way. He abandoned her and her child, leaving her to fend for herself.

However, with the intervention of the MOT Lapai team, free legal services were provided, which led to the man being held accountable and eventually agreeing to marry her as his second wife. He provided for her and their child, and the marriage was conducted in the presence of family representatives and the MOT Lapai team. The woman expressed gratitude to the team for their support, saying;

"I am happy for the women who listened to me and supported me.. May the Almighty Allah to continue to empower them for me... Amin."

Hauwa Madako, a dedicated supporter of PWAN's mission, played a pivotal role in bringing a perpetrator to justice in the Mandila community of Niger state. A six-year-old girl named Amina was brutally violated, and upon questioning, she courageously revealed the identity of her attacker – a young man in her neighborhood.

The alarming revelation sparked a chain reaction, with six other families coming forward to share similar experiences of their daughters being lured into the perpetrator's apartment and molested.

The community's outrage and concern prompted the families to report the case to the Tudun Wada police division. However, the police response was slow, and the families sought the assistance of PWAN to expedite the arrest. Hauwa Madako's tireless efforts, in collaboration with PWAN, led to the perpetrator's arrest the very next day. This swift action demonstrates the power of community-driven initiatives and the impact of dedicated individuals like Hauwa Madako.

The case is currently under investigation at the state CID in Minna. PWAN's involvement has not only brought a sense of relief to the affected families but also highlighted the organization's commitment to protecting vulnerable communities. The outcome of this case will serve as a testament to the effectiveness of community-led initiatives and the importance of collaboration in the pursuit of justice.

Simultaneously, another case was reported to the MOTs in Lapai of Safiya, who was suffering sexual abuse from her father. This report got to her tribal head, who informed the MOTs, leading to an intervention and working with formal authorities to arrest the perpetrator (her father).

Alongside the PWAN legal team, the Force Gender Desk Officer, and MOTs, Safiya received comprehensive care addressing both immediate safety concerns and longer-term recovery needs, including psychological support and sustainable living arrangements. The case demonstrates the need for collaboration between traditional leaders and formal support services to provide comprehensive care for GBV survivors. Women's presence in community safety and security in mixed-gender committees does not always mean that they can speak freely or participate actively in decision-making or planning, due mainly to the entrenched cultural norms and religious misinterpretations and enforcement by community leaders and structures.

As an organization dedicated to combating human rights violations against marginalized populations, we recognized the urgent need for a specialized group of individuals to collaborate and address the challenges faced in Niger and Kaduna states.

With support from the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), PWAN, was able to implement the project, 'Promoting community engagement, access to justice and protection for marginalized populations' in response to the CSSF 'call' specific to increasing access to justice, promoting the meaningful participation of women and other excluded groups, and responding to increasing levels of sexual and gender-based violence in northwest Nigeria.

The project aimed to advance engagement mechanisms and support structures which are inclusive and gender-sensitive, expanding outreach of access to justice services in Northwest Nigeria to provide better safety and protection for women and other marginalized populations and improve community policing relations. The project was implemented in Niger, Kaduna, and Katsina states.

Through this intervention, PWAN successfully established two distinct structures: Mixed Observer Teams (MOT) and Women-led Organizations (WLO's). This gap necessitated PWAN to establish the following;



A total number of 20 Mixed Observers Teams members were assigned to 2 LGAs and 10 Women Led Organisations were assigned in Kaduna state

A total number of 40 Mixed Observers Teams members were assigned to 4 LGAs and 10 Women Led Organisations were assigned in Niger state.

A total number of 5 women-led organizations were assigned to Katsina state.

This structure are in Four LGAs in Niger (Bosso, Bida, Suleja and Lapai) and Two LGAs in Kaduna (Kaduna North and Kaduna South).

The MOTs provided joint security through communitysecurity interventions; strengthened women's roles in security and safety provision; enhanced trust and sensitised women and broader communities to SGBV/SEA prevention and response and all women's security concerns.

The teams are composed of selected women in the formal security sector institutions (NPF, NSCDC, NDLEA) and informal security groups within the communities, women-led CSOs/CBOs, and community-based actors in the target states.

This successful transition from PWAN-initiated platforms to community-owned and operated programs demonstrates the effectiveness of our approach to sustainable community development. Each MOT now independently identifies local needs, designs targeted interventions, and implements programs while maintaining strategic partnerships with relevant stakeholders. Their diverse approaches and comprehensive programming across different LGAs showcase how locally led responses can create lasting change in addressing gender-based violence.

These success stories highlight how PWAN's initial investment in community structures has yielded selfsustaining platforms that continue to expand their impact in addressing gender-based violence across Niger State. In addition, the Katsina Office has been working collaboratively with Katsina State Government through the SA and SSA to the Governor. As a result of the synergy and collaboration, persons with disabilities are given special consideration and regard in all PWAN activities.

PWAN Katsina office kicked off 16 days of activism on November 27th and 28th with the training of women leaders who deal with GBV cases in their communities. Training participants include PWDs from different communities in Katsina State. A participant from the Nigeria National Association of the Deaf referred a case of rape involving a PWD.

Immediately, PWAN Katsina team swung into action by taking the brief of Sumayya who informed the team that one Liman Habibu drugged her with a substance in her drink and raped her when she lost consciousness. As a result, she conceived and has already given birth to a baby boy. She further stated that she has been mercilessly beaten, stigmatized and assaulted by her parents. PWAN engages the service of an interpreter through whom Sumayya's brief was taken.

PWAN further lodged a complaint at Central Police Station. Identification parade was conducted where 4 guys were brought in and Sumayya identified Liman Habibu as the perpetrator of the act. The matter has been transferred to State CID where statements of all parties concerned were taken through and the services of the sign language interpreter engaged by PWAN.

A visit was also conducted to the crime scene, pictures of same taken by the police officers as part of evidence needed to be contained in the case diary.

NIGER STATE

A. LAPAI LGA MOT:

<u>Activity 1: Establishment of GBV Ambassadors in Lapai</u> <u>LGA Community.</u>

The Lapai MOT's commissioned the Lapai Gender-Based Violence Ambassadors following a one-day training session.

This training focused on equipping the ambassadors with essential skills to effectively handle, report, and follow up on cases of gender-based violence identified within the community and brought together 40 ambassadors from diverse backgrounds, including students, teachers, representatives from religious organizations, traditional women leaders, market women, community women leaders, and security personnel.

The newly commissioned ambassadors are now empowered to serve as vital resources in their communities, fostering a safer environment for all and promoting a culture of respect and support.

B. BOSSO LGA MOT:

Activity 2: Skill Acquisition for Vulnerable Women

The team held a Gender-Based Violence (GBV) awareness session at GIDAN MAKAFI, a home for the visually impaired in Minna. The campaign focused on educating persons with disabilities by actively engaging them in discussions about GBV, raising awareness and deepening understanding within the community. The campaign also introduced accessible reporting mechanisms tailored to the needs of visually impaired individuals, ensuring they have the tools and support to report and respond to violence

C. BIDA LGA MOT:

<u>Activity 2: Promoting Disability Inclusion in GBV</u> <u>Advocacy in Bida LGA Community.</u>

The Bida Mixed Observers Team (MOT) held a special event to commemorate the International Day of Persons with disabilities. This occasion aimed to raise awareness about the challenges faced by individuals with disabilities, particularly in relation to gender-based violence (GBV).

During the event, various activities were organized to educate the community about the prevalence of GBV among persons with disabilities, focused on visually impaired persons and to discuss effective methods for addressing and preventing such violence.

The leader of the group focused on disability rights participated in the event, sharing valuable insights to real life situations. The event was a significant step towards promoting inclusivity and ensuring that the voices of persons with disabilities are heard and respected.

NIGER STATE

A. NIGER STATE WLO:

Activity 1: Establishment of GBV Clubs in Schools

The women led organisation in Niger state carried out two major activities for their second grant implementation. One of which is establishing GBV clubs in three schools and they trained 12 teachers from the schools who are to manage the clubs and ensure sustainability.

KADUNA STATE

A. KADUNA NORTH:

<u>Activity 1:Physical Awareness Session on GBV at</u> <u>School of Deaf, Kawo, Kaduna.</u>

The Mixed Observers Team (MOT) of Kaduna North demonstrated remarkable resilience in their efforts to combat gender-based violence (GBV) and build collaborative networks across communities and organizations.

Through persistent advocacy, capacity-building initiatives, and strategic partnerships, the team empowered diverse groups while reinforcing awareness and action against GBV. The team with a strong focus on inclusion and adaptability, organized a physical awareness session at the School of the Deaf, Kawo, Kaduna.

Despite challenges, the session successfully reached persons with disabilities, emphasizing their rights and the importance of creating safe, inclusive, and supportive environments for all.

B. KADUNA STATE:

<u>Activity 2: Strategic Partnership to Strengthen GBV</u> <u>Advocacy in Kaduna.</u>

In other for the MOT to expand their impact in Kaduna State, with the sole aim of creating more awareness and build partnership, they made an advocacy visit to the National Orientation Agency (NOA) office in Kawo, Kaduna to build stronger partnerships that can help drive lasting change in the fight against genderbased violence (GBV) in the state.

During the visit, the MOT team shared updates on their work, highlighting the initiatives they have led, their progress, and the importance of working together to address GBV effectively.

They also emphasized how partnerships between grassroots efforts and government bodies can lead to more sustainable solutions.

A. KATSINA STATE:

<u>Activity 1: Media Awareness in Collaboration with</u> <u>Katsina State Government at Gram FM</u>

PWAN, in collaboration with the Katsina State Government and in commemoration of the International Day of Persons with Disabilities 2024, conducted a media campaign at Gram FM 95.7 Katsina State. The media awareness aims at informing the general public on the laws and remedies available for persons with special needs, challenges faced our communities, differences in in communication barriers, and non-inclusivity in government and private organizations. Integral to the discussions,

PWAN was introduced, and the inclusivity of PWDs in all its activities and providing access to justice to the marginalized populations. The speakers emphasised

B. KATSINA STATE:

Activity 2: Road walk in Collaboration with Katsina State Government in Commemoration of the International Persons with Disability Day

PWAN collaboration with in Katsina State Government conducted a stakeholder meeting and road walk in commemoration of the International Persons with disability day. The commemorative event is designed to promote the rights and well being of persons with disabilities in all spheres of society and development. It further highlights the importance of inclusivity, accessibility and equal opportunities for individuals with disabilities while also celebrating their achievements and contributions to the society.

C. KATSINA STATE:

<u>Activity 3: Media Awareness at Alfijir Radio</u> <u>Katsina State</u>

The team further conducted a media awareness at Alfijir Radio in commemoration of the International PWD day. The media awareness centered on the problems and issues affecting People with the Disability. The Media Awareness was conducted in Hausa Language respectively, live calls and messages from social media handles came in from listeners too. discussed on how the PDSS lawyers attend to people with special needs at their various police Division, how the PDSS lawyers or PWAN assist in taking the statement of people with special needs at the station to ensure access to justice.

The media awareness is being used as an instrument in sensitizing and educating the public on the effect of discrimination and mistreatment against Persons with Disabilities which may lead to Ostracization and exclusion from the society. The awareness further highlighted key issues regarding non inclusivity, thereby identifying gaps and barriers, equal opportunity for employment and participation in public life. The campaign concluded on calling members of the society to carry along persons with special needs on all their activities and resist from all forms of discrimination or mistreatment against them.

D. FUNTUA LGA KATSINA STATE: Activity 4: Physical Awareness at Funtua.

The PWAN further commemorated the International Day of Persons with Disabilities by conducting a physical awareness event in Funtua, Katsina State. The event aimed to celebrate persons with special needs and address pressing issues affecting their community. The sessions were designed to address topics such as: Breaking barriers and promoting inclusivity, Understanding stigmatization and discrimination against persons with disabilities (PWDs), Gender-based violence against PWDs and its impact in our society.

The awareness event aimed to deepen participants' knowledge of their rights and the legal and social frameworks that protect PWDs. Personal stories of overcoming stigmatization were shared among PWDs, promoting a sense of community and solidarity. The awareness brought together a diverse range of participants, including: Special Assistant to the Governor on Persons with Disabilities, Chairman Association of People Living with Disabilities Funtua NSCDC, Branch. NPF, NDLEA, FOMWAN, Association of Sign Language Interpreters, Chairman of Funtua LG, and various clusters of Persons with Disabilities.

E. KATSINA STATE:

<u>Activity 5: Door to Door Road Walk Awareness</u>

PWAN provided walking sticks to visually impaired and persons with Disabilities in Katsina State. The aim is to greatly improve PWD's quality of life who are visually impaired and provide support and stability enabling them to move around independently and safely as well as providing additional support and balance. The walking stick will navigate their surroundings more easily, reducing their reliance on others for assistance, which can lead to a greater sense of independence and self-reliance.

The objective is to Enhance Safety and enable the visually impaired to detect obstacles or uneven terrain, reducing the risk of tripping or stumbling, and to ensure that marginalized populations are included. In Attendance at the event were The Head of Association of the blind, The Chairman Joint National Association of Persons with Disabilities, The Special Assistant to the Governor on Persons with Disabilities, Sign Language Interpreters, and Persons with Disabilities.

ESTABLISHMENT OF PWAN STRUCTURES AS AN ENGAGEMENT MODEL:

Enhancing Gender-Responsive Security Operations and Community Dialogue Project in Borno, Yobe, and Adamawa State

SUPPORTED BY: UN WOMEN

PWAN intervened in the case of Mohammed Yahaya, who had been experiencing cruelty and inhuman treatment from his uncle because he claims the boy is stubborn.

Mohammed was initially living with his parents, however, due to his stubbornness as they claimed, he sent by his mother to Gujba to live with his uncle whom they claimed has the requisite tricks and tactics to handle a stubborn boy. Mohammed was way billed like a parcel from Jigawa to Gujba in a boot of a commercial vehicle.

On arriving Gujba, the uncle picked him up from the park and took him home with an already planned procured chain awaiting the boy. Mohammed was chained for 2 months before the case was reported to PWAN through the Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

Upon investigation, Mohammed was found in the house, chained in a degrading, heartless and inhuman manner. The legs and knee were already injured and rotten with maggots coming out of it. The CSP have successfully reunited the mother with her son. Mohammed has been enrolled into informal education and goes to the safe space for PSS activities to play and learn with other children.

Mohammed's mother resides in a community where the impoverished are often marginalized and exploited, with no one to advocate for their rights. Tragically, her son fell victim of inhuman and degrading treatment. As a poor widow, his mother lacked the financial resources to pursue justice through the courts or hire legal representation.

However, she remained determined to seek accountability. Fortunately, justice has been served with the intervention PWAN, the perpetrator of this cruel and heartless impunity has been brought to book, now serving his imprisonment. This intervention brought some solace to the family of Mohammed, they now begin to heal

"Seeing justice served brought me closure and helped me begin to heal from the traumatic experience of my son. The support empowered me to advocate for myself and other vulnerable individuals in my community. I regained hope in the justice system. My family and I finally received justice for my son's tragic experience.

Similarly, the life of Khadija seemed marked by desperation and hopelessness before PWAN's intervention. She was orphaned and living in Konduga LGA, Borno State, and was thrown out of her home after becoming pregnant at just 13 years old. With no education or skills, Khadija was stranded and couldn't know what to do so she decided to join the girls who were engaged in sex for money.

She went to live with those girls in their lodge and was forced into sex work to survive

The traumatic events took a toll on her physical and emotional well-being, culminating in the loss of her baby boy.

ESTABLISHMENT OF PWAN STRUCTURES AS AN ENGAGEMENT MODEL:

Zainab Abba, a MOT member, reported Khadija's case to the team members, and the team rallied around her. PWAN through the Mixed Observers Team (MOT) initiative, intervened in Khadija's life, changing her trajectory forever.

he Konduga MOTs provided transportation to Maiduguri for medical checkups, covered Khadija's hospital bills at the University of Maiduguri Teaching Hospital, and facilitated HIV testing and treatment, including retroviral drugs.

The MOT team also tracked down Khadija's relatives and reunited her with her aunt, Hajja Fati, providing a safe and loving home.

Furthermore, they advocated for Khadija's rights and pursued justice against the perpetrator, a 26-year-old boy who had abandoned her.

Hajja Fati, adds, "UN Women's intervention brought joy back to our family. We thought Khadija was lost forever."

The support not only transformed Khadija's life but also had a ripple effect in her community. The MOT's efforts raised awareness about HIV/AIDS and GBV, encouraged community members to report similar cases, and demonstrated the importance of supporting vulnerable girls and women.

Khadija's story inspired others in her community. MOT members continue to identify and support vulnerable girls and women, while community leaders now prioritize GBV cases and collaborate with MOT. The MOT members have also reach out to an organization to provide livelihood support to Khadija's new home, empowering her to rebuild her life. Today, Khadija is enrolled in a vocational training program, learning tailoring skills and building a brighter future. She dreams of starting her own business and becoming a role model for other girls in her community. Khadija's story serves as a testament to the transformative power of PWAN work, demonstrating that with collective action and support, even the most vulnerable individuals can overcome adversity and thrive.

"I didn't know what the future held, and I thought I had reached the end of the road. The support from PWAN's intervention Women changed my life completely. I received medical care, a safe home, and a new chance at life. I'm now living with my aunt, who loves and cares for me. I'm grateful for PWAN, They gave me a second chance at life. I won't waste it."





RULE OF LAW PROGRAM AREA

In 2024, PWAN embarked on an ambitious mission to address the challenges of the rule of law. By utilizing a cooperative advocacy approach, PWAN worked actively with various stakeholders to ensure a more equitable and stable society.

Through the Rule of Law program area which focuses on promoting integrity and strengthening institutions to improve the effectiveness of civil society and the justice system in general, PWAN has been able to develop a society where individuals are confident that they can rely on the institutions that have been made sustainable and accessible to protect and serve them.

In northeast Nigeria, PWAN with support from several funders successfully established several facilities that provided free legal services. These facilities were strategically located in communities where legal assistance was most needed. Through dedicated staff and volunteers, PWAN provided legal advice, representation, and counseling to individuals who otherwise may not have had the means to seek justice.

Furthermore, PWAN also implemented serval programs by deploying pro bono lawyers to police stations across different states by providing legal representation to individuals who have been arrested or detained, and ensuring that their rights are protected, and that justice is served.

By working closely with the Nigeria Police Force (NPF) and adhering to Force Order 20, PWAN aimed to promote both law and order, while also upholding the fundamental human rights enshrined in the Administration of Criminal Justice Law of different states.

PWAN has been able to achieve several successful interventions, measures, and strategies as a result of its efforts to enhance the effectiveness of civil society and the legal sector, as well as to enhance the effectiveness of the criminal justice system and the civil society sector.

INTERVENTION MEASURES AND STRUCTURE

ESTABLISHMENT OF PWAN STRUCTURES AS AN ENGAGEMENT MODEL: Expanding Access to Justice in Plateau State

SUPPORTED BY: MACARTHUR FOUNDATION

PLATEAU STATE

PWAN expanded its 'Enhancing transparency and accountability in the judicial sector' project to Plateau State with support from the MacArthur Foundation.

Under the project, PWAN sought to improve access to justice and support pro-bono services within Plateau state. In a bid to address the lack of legal support at the police stations, PWAN provided legal education, advice, and representation to indigent residents of Kano state and implemented the Police Duty Solicitor Scheme (PDSS) by deploying lawyers to police stations in Plateau state.

The PWAN team engaged with the COPs in Plateau state

and conducted trainings for the support staff of the judiciary and low-ranking police officers in the state in collaboration with the Ministry of Justice.

The organization engaged the services of 10 lawyers in Plateau State where the lawyers implemented the PDSS and provide pro-bono legal services to the indigent population in police custody and at the correctional centres in collaboration with the Sexual Assault Referral Centres (SARC) in the state, Legal Aid Council, NHRC, FIDA, and NBA as this will harmonize and strengthen legal aid provision in the state and lead to sustainability of the intervention.

To further enhance access to justice in Plateau state, PWAN through the lawyers engaged and collaboration with key stakeholders, carried out a citizens education campaign across communities in Plateau state to enlighten the citizens about the Laws and the protection afforded to them under its provisions. The campaigns involved interaction with members of the communities consisting of women, children, and marginalised groups with collaboration with the gatekeepers of the communities and religious leaders. At the exercise, legal clinics were conducted, and citizens laid their complaints and receive legal advice or further services based on the complaint raised. Referrals to the appropriate or responsible agency or institution for further action or attention were also conducted with proper follow up to ensure resolutions being made. For wider coverage, PWAN conducted a public sensitization exercise utilising the media. Citizens took the opportunity to call in and were informed on the existence of a pro-bono office in the state as well as the contact information for other stakeholders providing pro-bono legal services and other justice related services.

The public sensitization exercise was be conducted in Jos North, Jos South, Jos East and Pankshin local Government area of the state

DEEPENING UNDERSTANDING OF THE POLICE ACT 2020 IN NIGERIA.

SUPPORTED BY: FOREIGN, COMMONWEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT OFFICE (FCDO).

<u>Activity 1: Police leadership training on compliance</u> with the provisions of the Police Act 2020

Partners West Africa Nigeria (PWAN), in collaboration with the Nigerian Police Force Training Department engaged in Police leadership training on compliance with the provisions of the Police Act 2020.

A total of 149 officers were trained in 3 sessions, which focused on the Police Act 2020 and its regulations to help police leaders effectively guide their teams in adherence to the law.

The trainings cut across various levels of senior Police officers, including Chief Superintendent of Police (CSP), Superintendent of Police (SP), Divisional Police Officers (DPOs), and Divisional Crime Officers (DCOs).

As a precursor to these trainings, PWAN in collaboration with the National Institute of Police Studies (NIPs), and the Complaints Response Unit identified awareness gaps in the Police Act and the right cadre of officers who should be targeted.

The collaboration allowed for a robust training that would help to create a more knowledgeable, efficient, and community-oriented police force.

<u>Activity 2: Town hall meetings to enlighten members</u> of the Public on the Police Act 2020 and Regulations

Partners West Africa Nigeria (PWAN), conducted 2 comprehensive series of Townhall Meetings focused on Human Rights and the Police Act 2020.

The first series of 6 Townhall meetings enlisted the participation of diverse stakeholders including traditional and religious leaders, community members, market women, youth leaders, students, People Living with Disabilities (PLWDs), and representatives bringing them together to foster greater understanding of police functions and civilian rights.

PWAN, with the aim of increasing awareness of the Nigerian Police Act 2020 and its role in addressing longstanding issues within the Nigeria Police Force (NPF), launched a nationwide awareness campaign (In representative States like Kano (North-West), Plateau (North-Central), Borno (North-East), Lagos (South-West), Edo (South-South), and Enugu (South-East)).

The forums featured expert presentations that clarified critical aspects of the legislation, including citizens' rights during arrests, proper statement collection procedures, bail rights, regulations governing stop and search operations, guidelines for public assemblies, and community policing frameworks.

<u>Activity 3: Media meetings to enlighten members of</u> the Public on the Police Act 2020 and Regulations

The second series of Townhall meetings involved the participation of media personnel in 6 Media Townhall meetings across all 6 geopolitical zones of Nigeria, which covered how the media involvement can aid with the mainstreaming of the Police Act 2020 in their reporting on cases such as arrest, stop and search, and profiling as well as its impact on police-citizen interactions

In response to these meetings, several participants took to their various platforms to not only cover the meetings they attended, but to share with their audiences the provisions of the Police Act.

Furthermore, 2 prominent radio stations, Express Radio and Kanawa Radio, were impressed by the project's focus on human rights, particularly for marginalized communities, and offered PWAN 26 free slots for continued discussions on the Police Act 2020.

The program also employed media engagements and a printing of a concise version of the Nigeria Police ACT 2020 titled - 'Know Your Rights' to educate communities about police reforms.

By facilitating direct public engagement across these diverse regions, the project aims to rebuild public trust in law enforcement, enhance police accountability, and ultimately foster more constructive policecommunity relations throughout Nigeria.

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By demystifying the Police Act's objectives and highlighting its role as an instrument for human rights protection, PWAN has advanced public knowledge regarding proper police conduct and accountability measures.

ESTABLISHMENT OF PWAN STRUCTURES AS AN ENGAGEMENT MODEL: PROMOTING COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, ACCESS TO JUSTICE AND PROTECTION FOR MARGINALIZED POPULATIONS

SUPPORTED BY: FOREIGN, COMMONWEALTH AND DEVELOPMENT OFFICE (FCDO)

The story of Mrs Rukayya Ali, a nursing mother who was arrested in luie of her husbad Mr. Ali in Kano State. This story is also a tastement of the impactful intervention that illustrates the importance access to justice, and protecting of human rights and respect for the rule of law.

Mrs. Rukayya Ali is a nursing mother of a 2 years old son who lives in Kano with her husband. Unfortunately, one day, she was arrested by the Kano State Police Divisions in Kano state in lieu of her Husband (Mr. Ali), a Businessman who purchased a car from a vendor and refused to complete the payment after several demands.

The vendor decided to lodge a complaint with the police and the police immediately send an invitation to him to hear and investigate the matter. However, instead of honouring the invitation, He secretly packed his belongings and runaway leaving the family with no one to cater for their needs. The police upon inquiries found out that he is at large and instead decided to arrest his NURSING WIFE to bait him back.

Lucky for her, the day she was brought in, she was identified by PWANs PDSS lawyer in one of the Police Divisions in Kano where narrated her ordeal in the presence of the PDSS lawyer and the DPO of the division. The PDSS lawyer immediately, took up the case and ensured that she was released and justice was served.

"I am thankful to the PDSS lawyer from PWAN who got me released immediately, and enlighten the police they had no right to arrest me for my husband's actions." The PDDS lawyer also enlighten the police division that according to the provisions of the constitution, Administration of Criminal Justice Law and the Police Act, the police do not have the right to arrest anyone for an offence committed by another person no matter their relationship.

The lawyer went further to educate Mrs. Rukayya Ali on the various channels she can follow to get justice whenever her rights are infringed such as the PWAN office, National Human Rights Commission, Legal Aid Council and the Police Complaint Response Unit.

Simultaneously, another case of deaf vulcanizer was picked up by the PDSS lawyers. Kurma, a 50-year-old deaf vulcanizer, who had lost three fingers during a misunderstanding with a customer, who intentionally pushed him into a machine he was working with. The machine severely mutilated his hand. When the matter was reported to the police, instead of investigating and prosecuting the attacker, officers forced Kurma into a mediation process. The culprit was merely asked to provide some medication and food items as settlement.

Due to his hearing impairment, Kurma was unable to communicate effectively with the police. His young child tried to speak on his behalf, but the police failed to recognize the need for alternative communication methods. As a result, the gravity of the assault was ignored, and no justice was served.

During a routine station visit, a young PDSS lawyer from PWAN noticed Kurma in distress, struggling to communicate through sign language with his child. After making inquiries, she was alarmed by the injustice and immediately escalated the matter to the Divisional Police Officer (DPO).

The DPO summoned the Investigating Police Officer (IPO), ordered a recall of the case, and ensured that both parties were properly heard. The matter was reassessed, and the culprit was eventually charged to court, with hopes of securing proper compensation for Kurma's injury.


Kurma's case highlights a serious gap in the criminal justice system the lack of support and proper procedures for persons with disabilities. It also emphasizes the critical role of legal aid and the need for law enforcement agencies to be trained in inclusive communication and human rights standards.

These are just few stories of lives we have impacted and intervened in all these was possible with the support we got from support from the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), with the focus on improving access to justice, in Northwest Nigeria.

The project was implemented with the aim of expanding the reach of legal support services. Its core focus was to enhance protection and improve access to justice for women, detainees, and other marginalized populations, as well as to strengthen community-police relations.



TA key achievement of the project was the deployment of pro bono lawyers stationed at police divisions across both states. These lawyers provided free legal education, advice, and representation to indigent individuals, especially those in police custody.

heir presence at police stations promoted compliance with Force Order 20 of the Nigeria Police Force (NPF) and the Administration of Criminal Justice Law (ACJL) in both states. In addition to legal services, the lawyers supported detainees by helping to secure bail where applicable, monitoring due process, and ensuring cases were either charged to court or properly transferred to the relevant investigative units.

Many of the lawyers involved in the project were also drawn from the Mobilization and Outreach Team (MOT) and collaborated with key stakeholders including the Sexual Assault Referral Centres (SARC), Legal Aid Council, National Human Rights Commission (NHRC), the International Federation of Women Lawyers (FIDA), and the Nigerian Bar Association (NBA).

This collaborative model strengthened the delivery of legal aid services and established a more sustainable framework for ongoing support to the indigent population, especially those in detention or correctional centres.

The project has also led to a significant shift in the attitude of law enforcement officers. Police personnel have become more receptive to the presence and interventions of PDSS lawyers. There is now increased cooperation, with officers allowing easier access to case files, record books, and suspects in custody. The bail process has become more transparent and efficient, particularly for detainees charged with bailable offences who meet the legal requirements. As a result, cell congestion has reduced significantly across police stations in both states.

In conclusion, the project successfully improved access to justice and protection for marginalised populations in Northwest Nigeria. It also helped foster mutual trust between the police and the legal aid system, creating a more responsive and rightsrespecting justice environment.

PWAN's coordinated efforts with community leaders, government agencies, and legal institutions demonstrate the power of public-private partnerships in advancing human rights and strengthening justice systems for the most vulnerable.

This year, PWAN actively engaged individuals with disabilities in various capacities, including as mixed observer teams, focal persons, and participants in its activities. To achieve this, PWAN implemented targeted outreach programs to identify and recruit individuals with disabilities who could contribute meaningfully to our mission. Training sessions and workshops were organized to equip these individuals with the necessary skills and knowledge to participate in PWAN's initiatives effectively. Additionally, PWAN established support systems and accessible resources to facilitate the full inclusion of people with disabilities in all aspects of its work.

By prioritizing inclusivity, PWAN fosters a diverse and representative organization, strengthening its impact on the communities it serves. This approach not only enhances the organization's credibility and effectiveness but also sets a powerful example for other institutions in the region. PWAN's commitment to inclusivity aligns with its mission to empower all citizens and improve security governance through its Rule of Law and Citizens Security Program Areas, ensuring that the rights and needs of all individuals, including those with disabilities, are addressed and upheld.


